PROBLEM STATEMENT

NCHRP 20-6, Combined Statement of Work Study Topic 13-3, Civil Rights Section; Study Topic 13-4, Constitutional Law Section; Study Topic 13-5, Indian Transportation Law Section; Study Topic 13-6 Motor Vehicle Law

The NCHRP 20-6, project Legal Problems Arising from Highway Programs has virtually completed revisions of four (4) volumes of Selected Studies in Transportation Law that relate to highway projects. These volumes included Contracts, Eminent, Environmental and Torts. There will also be two (2) volumes on transit law. The committee now wishes to explore the feasibility of an additional volume that would definitely include sections dealing with civil rights, constitutional law, Indian transportation law, motor vehicle law and possibly governmental relations.

This project has published legal research digest in these areas. The committee does not believe that there is sufficient information, relevant to each of the above substantive areas, to comprise separate volumes of Selected Studies in Transportation Law. Instead, TRB will consider including these topics as different sections in a single volume.

We envision one author per study topic, although an offeror can submit on as many study topics as he/she wishes.

The successful offeror(s) will be expected to develop a work plan for each study topic along with a detailed outline for a 125-200 page report which will comprise a section within a volume of SSTL. The detailed outline will be sufficient to demonstrate that a section can be developed within the allocated pagination that provides a highway attorney what he/she needs to know about the subject area including crucial issues to be resolved.

Study Topic 13-5 Indian Transportation Law

This section will examine legal issues arising out of Federal, State and local transportation agencies' relations with Indian Tribes – Government-to-government relations with Indian tribes touch a gamut of legal issues: contracting with the tribes, Tribal Employment Rights ordinances (TERO), funding issues, land use impacts of tribal improvements on state highways, real property issues arising out of rights-of-way through Indian reservations, regional planning issues, compliance with environmental laws bumping up against Indian sovereign immunity, tort liability issues, etc. The federal government has a fairly well delineated relationship with Indian tribes based upon unique trust obligations owed to them as domestic dependant nations. States and local governments do not have that same relationship and yet must interact with tribal government s on a number of legal issues. The constitutional or statutory authority conferred upon these states and local jurisdictions to do so, to the extent it exists, is a patchwork of laws that varies from jurisdiction to jurisdiction, leave huge gaps, in some cases, in a state or local transportation agency's ability to conduct business with a tribe. Moreover, there is an overlay of federal law which may affect the rights and obligations of state and local agencies. Prior legal research digest related to Indian legal issues are listed below. TASK 1. Research Plan and Detailed Report Outline. Consultant will conduct background research and develop a complete research plan. The final step

of this task will consist of a work plan and a detailed outline for a 100-150 page report for each study topic. This material will be submitted to TRB for approval.

Consultant will include in his/her cost proposal \$1,500.00, cost reimbursable, travel expenses for a meeting with the committee/subcommittee in Washington, DC, Woods Hole, Massachusetts, or Irvine, California to discuss aspects of the research plan/detailed outline.

TASK 2. Draft report in accordance with the approved outline (including modifications required by TRB).

Estimated Length of Time: 90-120 days Estimated work effort: 225 hours

Revise report as necessary. Offeror should estimate that 2 revisions will be necessary. One revision may be required after review by the Principal Investigator and members of the Governmental Subcommittee.

Additional, revisions may be required after the report has been reviewed by the full committee.
