Volunteer for Panel Service

The Transportation Research Board (TRB), part of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine, provides near-term solutions for problems facing state, regional, and local transportation agencies; airports; and transit agencies through its Cooperative Research Programs. Research is conducted by contractors with technical oversight provided by a panel of 8-10 practitioners and industry experts who volunteer from transportation agencies, academia, and private consulting firms.

Why Volunteer to Serve on a Panel?

- Help solve problems of national importance and advance the state of practice.
- Cultivate leadership skills and professional expertise while networking with experts and peers.
- Join a community of practice with transportation planners, engineers, and researchers.
- Directly contribute to new products, techniques, and guidelines to create a safer, more reliable, and cost-effective transportation service.

What Are Volunteers' Responsibilities?

- Attend three in-person meetings (travel expenses are paid for).
- Develop a request for proposals and recommend research contractors.
- Monitor research progress, review reports and deliverables, and provide feedback on the contractor's work.
- Participate in occasional conference calls.
- Support research implementation.



Who Should Volunteer?

- Industry leaders and subject matter experts.
- Qualified practitioners who reflect the nation's diversity and represent a variety of backgrounds and life experiences.

Typical topic areas critical to state departments of transportation, airports, and transit agencies include: Administration, Planning, Design, Environment, Construction, Operations, Maintenance, Safety, Security, Sustainability, and Legal Issues.

Who Can Respond to an RFP?

Anyone may submit a proposal. Proposers must demonstrate extensive capabilities and proven experience in the research topic. TRB encourages participation of small businesses, minority-owned firms, and women's business enterprises, as contractors or subcontractors for projects. Proposers based outside the United States may respond to RFPs.
