

# Partnering for Success: Agricultural Emergency Response

Disease outbreak may strike livestock rapidly and without warning. It's important that states collaborate, communicate, and pre-plan with one another to respond to these emergency outbreaks. In 2009, Kansas and Oklahoma conducted the first bi-state exercise focused on interstate livestock movement control for a disease outbreak in a non-contiguous state. Panelists will discuss the lessons learned from this exercise, including the importance of partnering with state departments of transportation and law enforcement personnel from the very beginning of the planning process.
